Original art of 4 *Eagle Books*, *Through the Eyes of the Eagle: Illustrating Healthy Living for Children* exhibits at CDC October, 2006 – January, 2007. CDC/ASTDR Tribal Advisory Committee hosts opening

***Through the Eyes of the Eagle: Illustrating Healthy Living for Children*, exhibit of original art work begins traveling to museums across the country (2007)**

***Eagle Adventure*, a program of The Chickasaw Nation and Oklahoma State University, selected by USDA as a Wave 1 Demonstration Project**

Caitlin Baker (age 12, Muscogee Creek, competitive swimmer) promotes *Eagle Books* on website and travel across country for swim meets

***Eagle Books* Community Outreach Campaigns hosted by Keweenaw Bay Ojibwa Community and Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska.** Lorelei DeCora, RN, creates *Eagle Books* Talking Circles in communities across the country

***Through the Eyes of the Eagle: Illustrating Healthy Living for Children* original art work of the stories exhibit at the Smithsonian National Museum of the American Indian** in Washington DC and New York, NY. October 2008 – January 2009. Plate Full of Color becomes a permanent menu item at the Smithsonian cafeteria in DC.

The Diabetes Education in Tribal Schools K-12 Curriculum, *Health is Life in Balance* debuts at Smithsonian, hosted by Tribal Leaders Diabetes Committee.

2009–2010

“Traditional Foods Project” cooperative agreements with 17 tribal programs established (2009-2013). *USA Today* and *Indian Country Today* report on tribal efforts to reclaim traditional foods for health. *Eagle Books* respect traditional knowledge about health for children in local programs.

***Coyote and the Turtle’s Dream*, an illustrated novel for middle school children, inspires input from youth for second novel, *Hummingbird’s Squash*.**

***Eagle Books* Community Outreach Campaigns held in Albuquerque, New Mexico, and Pendleton, Oregon.**

Muscogee Creek Nation translates *Eagle Books*, *Indian Country Today* reports. The Nation hosted the *Eagle Books* traveling art exhibit to coincide with release of the Muscogee Creek language *Eagle Books*.

***Coyote and the Turtle’s Dream* art and writing team participate in Comic-Con in New York, *Indian Country Today* reports.**
